Seventh Manoeuvre.

23. Countre-march on the centre. --- March.

(By wings inward face. --- March.)

This movement in Battalion or regiment, is executed by files equally; but it may be executed in larger bodies by sections, platoons, or subdivisions, as the ground or choice of the officer may require.

There are three modes of executing this counter-march.

The first is by each wing taking three steps to the right, and then wheeling by the left about on to the ground vacated by the opposite wings.

The second is by the central files when arrived at their nearest point of approach, face to face, going by the left about on a supposed pivot, between the centre of the files, forming a complete circle in the rotation; the files in the rear of each central file of the wing following the movement of the leading file, and incidentally form by the movement of the line of science; but

The third mode is the most disciplinary, and bears some resemblance to the second: as soon as the wings are faced inward, the order is given; or it is executed on public parade without order.
